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## From our Board Chair

Kia ora tatou e te whanau Hōhepa,

My previous article was written in the Autumn and now this is being written in the Spring! Time seems to go quickly and for some, the arrival of Christmas in a few weeks will feel like a reminder of that. This despite the fact that the increments of time between the seasons and the festivals are the same each year.

This day-to-day time in the Greek language is known as Chronos – the ordinary time, from which we derive terms such as chronological, chronology etc.

But there is another term, which I first became aware of as a Presbyterian Minister. It is Kairos – the decisive time. Towards the end of the film Forrest Gump, Forrest himself is shown at a fourway rural intersection enquiring from a passerby as to the direction of a certain location. The scene ends with the passerby driving off and Forrest contemplating which way he should go.

While the passage of ordinary time, chronos, is a constant, from time to time (pardon the pun) moments of Kairos come our way as well. These times of decision are ones which we often look back on, in the rear-view mirror, which is the benefit of hindsight. Possessing fore sight at these times can be hard to do.

The task of our board is to possess fore sight, which is why we have been undergoing training and upskilling in health and safety obligations for instance. Sometimes, we can use hindsight to inform this forward view.



The task for all of us I suggest is to ask, how can I enable those around me to live every life fully lived? This can apply both to those we support and to those we do not support. It is a question for everyone.

As we move forward into the Christmas season, hopefully we will find time to stand still at the intersections and to contemplate which way we would like to go, which decision we would like to make.

I really enjoyed learning from Emma about Rudolf Steiner's concept of the 12 senses and how they applied to our own roles and lives. I enjoyed the interactive space, which included sharing reflections and ideas, clay modelling, pastel work and Eurythmy, we had lots of laughs and thought-provoking discussions over the day.

A key takeaway was the idea of 'constellations' - that a group was more than a random collection of people. People that might come together due to the roles they hold, or project work they embark on, and how initially there might not seem much cohesion but in fact each person in that constellation has a role to play and a way to contribute to the group to help it meet its aim.

The workshop facilitated by Emma Ratcliff was my first introduction to Rudolf Steiner's 12 senses model. The group activities, such as clay work and drawing, engaged our senses of movement and touch, connecting the team (or constellation) on a deeper level. These activities provided natural opportunities for collaboration beyond just speech and eye contact, allowing us to explore the process and dynamics through other senses. Recognising the sense of ego or "I" in these activities helped create an environment where everyone's contributions felt valued and respected. It also heightened our awareness of our own interactions and how we shared the space with others.

I particularly enjoyed the mix of intensity and laughter throughout the workshop. The final activity, eurythmy, with its shared movement, was a wonderful way to finish. Everyone seemed calm and relaxed by the end, making it a truly enriching experience.




## A thought from Chris on the day

We saw some great masks and costumes. To celebrate the end of winter and the beginning of spring we love to get together, dress up and dance.













# Our lives are better with volunteers

Sonia has volunteered 1-1 with Robyne for over 2 years. After retiring from teaching students with learning disabilities, she learned of the opportunity to volunteer at Hōhepa through her daughter Nic. Sonia has supported Robyne to get involved with the "Knit for Purpose" initiative to knit peggy squares to be made into blankets for people in need, but her main role with Robyne has been one of companionship. Sonia also loves hiking and has been able to jump in with the Adventure group on Fridays when needed

What made you want to volunteer at Hōhepa?

I used to work next door when I was a teacher at Cashmere High - my classroom was right next to the fence. My daughter Nicola worked here, and when I retired from teaching I wanted something to do and thought there must be something I could do to help. Years ago I had worked at a special needs school in Invercargill, and so was keen to do something similar.

HŌHEPA VOLUNTEER MANAGER JO ASKED TWO OF OUR VOLUNTEERS, SONIA RUTHERFORD AND DIANE AGNEW, HOW THEY FELT ABOUT VOLUNTEERING AT HŌHEPA. What do you do here?

I sit with Robyne and usually we knit, and today we did a puzzle. We just talk and we sometimes go for a walk by "the lady" (the statue) in the garden, we circle her a few times in Robyne's wheelchair before we go back to her house. Sometimes I also help on a Friday with on the Adventure group and I enjoy doing that.

What motivates you to 'turn up'?

It's so nice and I am getting to know different people we support, and they say hello to me, sometimes they call me "Trouble" and we have a good laugh. I am just amazed at what goes on here, and love what all the staff do here.

I really enjoy it being part of it. Everyone is so nice. I like coming at Christmas as well to see Robyne, even when LEAP is closed. Everyone here is so lovely people – the people we support, staff and other volunteers.

What has been one of the highlights of your role? Seeing Robyne every week, and getting to know Robyne, and building that relationship with her over time. If it hadn't been for the anniversary card that I just got for volunteering wouldn't have known it had been two years. The card has a photo of me and Robyne on it and it sits in on my shelf where I can see it.

I also went to the Dine and Dance and loved to see everyone dressed up, dancing and having so much fun!



What do you do for fun?

I go bike riding and I do the garden. I'm doing Round the Mountain in February (Kingston to Te Anau and back to Queenstown).

If one of your friends or family said they wanted to volunteer here, what advice would you give them?

Ooh I would say yes! It's great. The person who is in charge of the volunteers is pretty good - she does a pretty good job!



Joy shared with kings, for Peace the world would bless




